Remembering Kathleen West (1925-2023), Longtime Winnetka Heights Resident

Excerpt from a 2015 newsletter interview with Miss West included below

Kathleen West moved to Winnetka Heights in 1953 and has seen a lot of changes since that time. She celebrated her 90th birthday in May with a porch party. Miss West graciously consented to an interview to share stories of the neighborhood and her life including her upbringing in East Texas.

Where did you grow up?

I was born in Grand Island, Nebraska. But we moved to Texas when I was five because of the Depression. My uncle and aunt had moved to Texas – Dallas – where he worked. And he said he could get a job for my Dad if he wanted to come down. Dad said, sure, you know. So we moved to Dallas. But when we got here he found out the place my uncle worked would not hire a relative. And they were spreading the work around because people were so out of work. When my dad's job fell through we didn't stay in Dallas long. My mother's brother had some property in East Texas. And it had a house on it. So we moved there. It was in a little town called Redwater. It was about 13 miles from Texarkana.

How long did you live in East Texas?

That's when the oil boom hit and we moved to Gladewater. My Dad was working there – don't know just what he did. If you were living there every back yard had oil derricks in them. You weren't out in the field - you were just right there.

Tell me when you moved to Winnetka Heights and about your early memories of Winnetka Heights.

We just rented a house at first. Then we bought this house [200 block of South Rosemont] in May of 1953. We settled down and we didn't do any more moving. There were more young children back then. I remember lots of kids would come at Halloween. Children lived next door. Then gradually seemed like the older folks were dying off, and now the younger people are buying them up and fixing them. So the neighborhood has changed. But we still don't have very many children. Well, we got two now across the street and some down a ways.

We got acquainted with more people on our block when - I think it was 1970 - when my sister started canvassing to get the petition to get the zoning change. She was working with Ruth Chenoweth and the Old Oak Cliff Conservation League. I don't think we had Winnetka Heights then. Well, we had Winnetka Heights section but not the neighborhood association.

You did a lot of the work on your house over the years. Like painting it. Is that right?

Oh, yeah, interior we did wallpaper and painting. We had the kitchen done over and the bathroom done over. The fellow that was doing it - I think he also had to replace this front picture window - was there. And Kathryn was painting the baseboard after we had new carpet put in. He looked at her and said 'Boy, anytime you want a job painting for me you can'. She didn't ever get a drop of paint on anything. She was very careful. We both took more care than most people. That's why we would do it ourselves. If you want it done right, do it yourself. Course we didn't do it too often. I've got more painting to do. I've painted four doors this last month or so. I need to do the front door. Sometimes we painted the railing around the porch. But I don't get on ladders anymore. But we enjoyed doing that. One time we got a - what do you call it, a heat gun and stripped the paint down to the bare wood on these windows. I didn't think about it until years later. I bet that was lead paint. Didn't bother us, though. Maybe it wasn't lead paint. I don't know.

What's your secret to a long life?

Oh ... well. Somebody asked my sister that and she said 'Just keep breathing' Well - I, uh, I'll just say clean living, I guess. ... Don't have nasty ... habits, don't smoke and drink. That's caused a downfall on a lot of people.



Crime Watch Update from new chair, Andrew Skinner

Greetings from your new Crime Watch Chair for Winnetka Heights! My name is Andrew Skinner, and I am happy to serve as Crime Watch chair. My predecessor, Russ Aikman, did an excellent job in the role for many years, and his contributions were certainly a factor in making our neighborhood largely crime-free.

Crime Update in Winnetka Heights:

- Reported Crime in Winnetka Heights over the past six months is very low
- Auto theft and auto burglary account for all of the criminal incidents reported to DPD in Winnetka Heights
- Keep your car safe! Any car parked outdoors overnight can be a target for burglary. If you must park outside of a garage, be sure to remove any valuables from your vehicle
- Kia and Hyundai vehicles made between 2016 and 2021 have been disproportionately targeted by thieves using a technological vulnerability that has been widely spread across the internet. Owners of these vehicles should prioritize parking inside structures, and /or utilize secondary theft prevention measures such as a steering wheel lock or hidden fuel cut-off

Experience a crime?

- Call 911 if it's an emergency
- Otherwise file an online police report at <u>Dallaspolice.net</u>
 - Report even small crimes like minor property theft or vandalism. While unlikely to be solved, reporting them contributes to the data that police use to prioritize specific areas or crimes, and it helps give fellow neighbors a complete picture of what is happening in the neighborhood.

Code Compliance Update, Robbie Christopher

Have you ever wondered what was done to your home before you purchased it? There is online access to Master Permits and Certificates of Appropriateness (CA) applications <u>here</u>

Contractors are required to obtain Master Permits for their work and the permits include their contact information. Homeowners are not required to obtain one for work they do themselves. Also, if a previous owner did work without an approved CA, subsequent owners are responsible for correcting the problem before a new CA may be approved. Before you apply for a CA, spend a few minutes checking what has been done in the past. It may save you some time and frustration.

For those of you who have obtained an approved CA for current work, please remember to place the document where it is clearly visible so there is no question that the work being done is authorized.
